Boyer Jazz alumni perform with eminent musicians, composing film scores, recording with major labels and teaching jazz to students around the country. Boyer also hosts a jazz student exchange program with the prestigious Conservatorium van Amsterdam (Amsterdam Conservatory). With an emphasis on ensemble opportunities and improvisation, students are prepared to perform, tour and record. Students take four years of private lessons with a jazz instructor. Sibelius Academy, Helsinki

Sibelius Academy is responsible for providing the highest level of music education in Finland. The Academy trains artists skilled in independent artistic work, teachers and other music professionals. Sibelius Academy is also responsible for developing the Finnish music culture and fostering music tradition. Sibelius Academy is divided into two faculties, both responsible for teaching. There are about 1,400 students in

the Academy. Annually, around 150-170 new bachelor- and master-level students are admitted. More than a thousand students apply to the Academy each year. In addition to the Master of Music degree, you can also complete a licentiate degree or a doctoral degree at the Academy. In comparison to academic universities, doctoral studies are quite recent – the first doctoral degrees were completed in 1990. Sibelius Academy also provides youth and adult education. The purpose of youth education is to introduce musically gifted children and young people to high-level music education. Sibelius Academy Continuing Education is responsible for adult education in music and culture.

BANDCOACHES (14th and 15th of March)

Terell Stafford



Terell Stafford has been hailed as "one of the great players of our time, a fabulous trumpet player" by piano legend McCoy Tyner. Known for being a gifted and versatile player with a voice all his own, Stafford combines lyricism and a deep love of melody with a spirited, adventurous edge. This uniquely expressive, well-defined musical talent allows Stafford the ability to dance in and around the rich trumpet tradition of his predecessors while making his own inroads. the Jon Faddis Orchestra. Currently he is a member of the **GRAMMY** award winning Vanguard Jazz Orchestra (GRAMMY 2009, Best Large Ensemble, Live at the Village Vanguard), as well as a member of the **GRAMMY nominated Clayton Brothers** Quintet (for Best Instrumental Composition), and the Frank Wess Quintet.

Between 2006 and 2007 Stafford played an integral part on several albums including Diana Krall's GRAMMY nominated From this Moment On (2006) for which Stafford joined with the Hamilton-Clayton Jazz Orchestra. Stafford has recorded six albums as a leader with his debut album in 1995 entitled Time to Let Go (Candid). In 1997, he followed

this album with the critically acclaimed Centripedal Force (Candid). His third album as a leader was the popularFields of Gold (Nagel-Heyer) featuring the talents of Bill Cunliffe, Kiyoshi Kitagawa, Antonio Hart, and Rodney Green. His fourth release was the enthusiastically received New Beginnings(MAXJAZZ 2003) and features Mulgrew Miller, Derrick Hodge, Dana Hall, Steve Wilson, Dick Oatts, Harry Allen, and Jesse Davis. He followed this album with the critically acclaimed Taking Chances (MAXJAZZ 2007). Stafford's newest release, This Side of Strayhorn (MAX-JAZZ 2011) features Tim Warfield, Bruce Barth, Peter Washington, and Dana Hall, and has been called "the first must have album of 2011" and "genius". As a sideman Stafford has been heard on over 90 albums.

An educator as well as a performer, **Stafford currently holds the positions** of Director of Jazz Studies and Chair of Instrumental Studies at Temple University in Philadelphia where he has been a recipient of the University's "Creative Achievement Award." He is also a clinician for the prestigious Vail Foundation in Colorado and Jazz at Lincoln Center's Essentially Ellington Program. Formerly, Stafford served as a member of the faculty for the Juilliard Institute for Jazz Studies in New York. Dedicated to building the jazz arts community through education, Stafford currently sits on the board of the Jazz Education Network.

Jasper Blom



Jasper Blom (1965) is a leading tenor and soprano saxophonist of the young Dutch jazzgeneration and one of the most versatile players in the Benelux. He studied a.o. with Dave Liebman, Bob Brookmeyer, Herb Geller and Joe Lovano and has performed with Lee Konitz, Chet Baker, Nat Adderley, Bob Brookmeyer, George Duke, Randy Crawford, David Liebman, Conrad Herwig and many other international renowned artists.

Twice he has won the European Jazz Award and he has played at major jazz festivals in Europe, Asia, the Caribic and Canada and in clubs throughout Europe and the States. He has received compositions assignments from the North Sea Jazz Festival and the Jazz International Rotterdam Festival.

As a leader he has recorded six CDs with material ranging from energetic hard bop to free open improvised music. Jasper Blom currently is active as a player and composer of both contemporary improvised music and jazz, can be heard regularly throughout the Netherlands and Europe as an active player in different musical settings and teaches jazz saxophone at the conservatory of Amsterdam. Jasper Blom leads a quartet with Monk award winning top guitarist Jesse van Ruller that combines acoustic jazz material with electronics. This band has played at many clubs and festivals throughout Europe.

With alto and clarinet player Joris Roelofs he co-leads Ensemble a l'improviste dedicated to French Impressionism music. He is a member of the contemporary Big Band Ensemble of David Kweksilber that features some of the leading improvisers of the Dutch Impro scene like Wolter Wierbos, Guus Jansen and Peter van Bergen, the international woodwind octet of the German composer/arranger Florian Ross and many other bands and is frequently asked by Hollands top ensembles like the Metropole Orchestra and the Jazz Orchestra of the Concertgebouw to participate in studio and live sessions.
